Bruce Lawrence is a graduate of Princeton University in Oriental Studies and History (AB, magnum cum laude 1962) and Yale University in History of Religions, with specialization in Islam and Hinduism (Ph.D. 1972), Bruce B. Lawrence taught at Duke University for four decades. Since 2011, he has been Nancy and Jeffrey Marcus Distinguished Professor of Islamic Studies Emeritus at Duke and also adjunct Professor at Alliance of Civilizations Institute in Ibn Haldun University, Istanbul. Founding director of Duke Islamic Studies Center (2006-2010), he has also been a visiting professor at Dartmouth, Exeter (UK), Qatar, Istanbul and Indonesia. As the recipient of a Carnegie Scholars of Islam grant (2008-2010), he did research in Egypt, Ethiopia, and the southern Philippines as well as Indonesia. His research interests include: Afro-Asian Sufism; Global Islam; Contemporary Islam as Religious Ideology; Islamicate Cosmopolitanism; the Multiple Roles and Uses of the Qur'an. Together with Professor Carl W. Ernst, he has co-edited the Islamic Civilization and Muslim Networks series from University of North Carolina Press since 2002. Among his recent books are: The Islamicate Cosmopolitan Spirit (Wiley-Blackwell Manifestos, 2021), The Bruce B. Lawrence Reader, edited & with an Introduction by Ali Altaf Mian (Duke University Press, 2021), The Koran in English - A Biography (Princeton University Press, 2017), and Who is Allah? (University of North Carolina and Edinburgh University Press, 2015). Several of his books and articles have been translated into numerous languages, including Arabic, Persian, Turkish, and Bahasa Indonesian.
