James B. Hoesterey is Associate Professor and Winship Distinguished Research Professor in the Study of Religion at Emory University. His research focuses broadly on Islam, media, and politics. After completing his Ph.D. in cultural anthropology from University of Wisconsin-Madison, Hoesterey was the Shorenstein Postdoctoral Fellow at the Asia Pacific Research Center at Stanford University (2009-2010); the Andrew W. Mellon Postdoctoral Fellow in Islamic World Studies at Lake Forest College, (2011-2012); and, the ACLS New Faculty Fellow at the Center for Southeast Asian Studies at University of Michigan. His first book, Rebranding Islam: Piety, Prosperity, and a Self-Help Guru (Stanford University Press, 2016), chronicles the rise and fall of Indonesian celebrity preacher K.H. Abdullah Gymnastiar and was awarded runner-up for the 2016 Clifford Geertz Book Prize in the Anthropology of Religion. With generous funding from Notre Dame's "Contending Modernities" project, the Fulbright Foundation, and the Henry Luce Foundation, Hoesterey is currently working on his second book, Faith in Diplomacy: Indonesia, Soft Power, and the Making of "Moderate Islam." In addition to serving as executive board member for the Commission for Visual Anthropology (CVA), Hoesterey has worked on documentary television programs broadcast worldwide on Discovery Channel, National Geographic, and the BBC.
