Megan Adamson Sijapati is a Professor of Religious Studies at Gettysburg College. She holds a Ph.D. in Religious Studies from the University of California, Santa Barbara, and an M.A. in Religious Studies from the University of Colorado at Boulder. In addition to the history and practice of Islam and religions of South Asia, her interests include the body in religion, religion and modernity, contemporary Sufism, digital religion, and religious revival and reform. She is the author of numerous articles and three books: *Muslim Communities and Cultures of the Himalaya: Conceptualizing the Global Ummah*, co-editor (Routledge, 2021); *Religion and Modernity in the Himalaya*, co-editor (Routledge 2016); and *Islamic Revival in Nepal: Religion and a New Nation* (Routledge, 2011). She currently serves as the national co-chair of the Body in Religion program unit at the American Academy of Religion and on the Executive Board of the South Asian Muslim Studies Association.
